Thank you to everyone who joined us on Friday to mark the 80th anniversary of VJ Day. From wreath laying and guided walks at Tower Hill Cemetery to the moment of reflection at Arthur Titherington's bench, we hope the day offered a meaningful opportunity to remember those we lost and the end of WW2.

Paper cranes could be found decorating the Corn Exchange Café. Inspired by Sadako Sasaki, a young Japanese girl who folded over a thousand origami cranes in hope of healing, they serve as a global symbol of peace and remembrance.

This year's contest was open to all Witney Primary Schools, featuring a specially invited 'guest barrow' entry from The Ice Centre. The theme was "fairy gardens," with schools tasked to create a barrow suitable for donation to a care home to look after once the voting has taken place.



As always, our participating schools exceeded expectations with their submissions. The barrows showcased vibrant, pollinator-friendly plants, a detail that consistently impresses our judges. Furthermore, all entries were ecofriendly, with no plastic components.

Almost 400 people voted for their favourites enduring the sweltering heat at the Witney Carnival!

Mayor's Choice: Councillor Andy Bailey selected Our Lady of Lourdes for their fern-filled, beautifully natural garden featuring tiny wooden figures.

**People's Choice Award:** The 'Secret Garden 'by Windrush Primary School garnered the highest number of votes from stall visitors.

**Most Unusual Garden:** Madley Brook Primary School captured the attention of independent judges with their imaginative fairy school playground.

Once again, Witney Town Council has been truly impressed by the creativity, effort, and enthusiasm displayed by all entrants. Each barrow is simply stunning.





The wheelbarrows will soon be delivered to their respective care homes, where we are confident they will be cherished and nurtured as they were last year. The Mayor will visit the winning schools to present awards for the top entries, including the Most Unusual Garden and the People's Choice Award. Additionally, every participating school will receive a small token of appreciation for their involvement.

Witney Town Council is proud to announce the allocation of its annual Youth Services Grant to eight youthfocused organisations across the town.

With a total grant budget of £20,000, the Council was unable to fund all applications in full. However, each submission was carefully considered, and funding was awarded to projects that most closely aligned with objectives of the scheme. Priority was given to inclusive, preventative initiatives that offer openaccess support and benefits to young people in Witney—programmes that are clearly signposted, accessible, and provide measurable impact.

The successful applicants and their awarded projects are:

Witney Buttercross Scouts received £3,500 to purchase activity equipment. As one of the largest scout groups in the UK, with over 400 young people and 40 adult volunteers, they recently secured a 6.3-acre activity site and will use the funding to purchase tents, gazebos, and rope bridge-building supplies.

4th Witney Girl Guides were awarded £1,000 to help purchase tents and camping gear to support their outdoor activities.

West Oxfordshire Levellers, a not-forprofit Rugby League club, were granted £1,000 to run a Girls Rugby League Activity Day for school years 2–11. The event will promote inclusivity and break down barriers for girls new to team sports, focusing on enjoyment, teamwork, and confidence-building rather than athletic ability.

Yellow Submarine will receive £2000 to run its Witney Youth Club summer activities, which directly support families with learning disabled children aged 11-18 in Witney and West Oxfordshire in small groups of 12-16 young people at a time. They offer families respite and provide stimulating, fun activities for their children out and about in the local community, building their confidence and friendships.

Bright Futures Oxfordshire was awarded £3,648 to expand the youth work of The Station by introducing parenting courses. The initiative will offer courses across schools and community settings— aimed at parents of children in Years 5 and 6, and for parents of teenagers—to provide muchneeded support during critical transition periods.

Witney Food Revolution received £2,150 to run a food skills programme for teenagers. The initiative addresses the growing gap in essential cooking and meal-planning skills, aiming to reintroduce basic food knowledge through hands-on workshops.

The Parish of Witney received £2,500 to deliver an inclusive Enrichment Summer Camp in partnership with Abingdon and Witney College. Aimed at post-16 students, the programme will help young people build the skills and confidence needed to transition into further education, training, or employment.

Friends of Springfield School were granted £2,850 to fund therapeutic horse-riding sessions. These sessions, delivered in partnership with Riding for the Disabled, provide significant physical and emotional benefits to the children.

## New Commemorative Facilities at Witney's Cemeteries

We've been busy making some improvements at Witney's cemeteries—and we're pleased to announce that a number of projects are now finished. A new Children's Memorial Garden has been completed at Windrush Cemetery. It is designed to be a simple and dedicated space for quiet reflection and remembrance of younger family members who have passed.

This tree- shaded, peaceful area complements the existing Letters to Heaven post box and offers families another meaningful way to remember their loved ones. As part of the garden, a Pebble Pond gives families the option to purchase a personalised engraved pebble, displaying a name and date, as a lasting tribute. Other areas within the cemetery are designated for the scattering of ashes and burials.

Elsewhere in the cemetery, a new oak monolith which holds engraved memorial plaques, replaces a deteriorating tree that previously served this purpose. The monolith is sited within a small grove of trees and alongside the path that loops around the burial areas. Its wooden construction allows for easy removal and replacement of plaques that may require repair or refurbishment and distinguishes it from the more traditional stone grave memorials.

In Tower Hill cemetery a newly planted ashes scattering bed is nearing completion. Thoughtfully designed, the bed has been planted in sections to allow the greenery to flourish naturally while providing dedicated spaces for the respectful scattering of ashes.

Located in Section 2 near the back wall, adjacent to the footpath leading to the Smiths Estate, the bed offers a peaceful and serene environment for remembrance and is a perfect addition to the quiet, contemplative atmosphere of the cemetery.

### Developments to Witney's Open Spaces

We're pleased to share that a new replacement boardwalk has been installed by Oxfordshire County Council on the riverside path between Crown Lane and Farm Mill Lane, improving access and safety for everyone using the area.

This came about after a concern was raised at the Witney Annual Council Meeting in March, and our officers followed up with the County's Countryside Access Team to take action.

We always listen to concerns and act on them where we can in order to make a real difference in our community.



#### **Bench Renovation at the Leys**

We've finished refreshing the benches at The Leys, giving them a new lease of life. Each one has been jet-washed, the wooden slats sanded and re-stained, and the metal ends repainted. They're now looking much cleaner, smarter, and ready to be enjoyed by everyone using the area. The operations team will be rejuvenating benches in other locations around the town over the coming weeks!

#### Play Park Maintenance

The summer holidays gave us a good opportunity to talk about how we cared for our play areas and equipment and offered some information about the biggest play structures we had at the time.

The Black Forest Timber Towers located at the Leys and Burwell, which were great challenging climbs, had both been identified by ROSPA, who regularly inspected all our play equipment, as requiring some significant maintenance.

They have been on site at both play areas for more than a decade and are in need of a few replacement parts in addition to our routine care and maintenance.

Huck, the company that supplied and installed the original towers for us advise that there is a long lead time of an average of 6+ weeks on these parts, but we have placed the order and hope for that to be fulfilled as quickly as possible.

In the mean time they are not useable, so they will remain closed. We have lots of other fantastic challenges and opportunities for active play, with our Wheeled Sports and other equipment at our 11 play parks across the town. Many of these have accessible equipment.





#### **Cleaning and Clearing**



Our team has cleaned the cycle prohibition signs at St Mary's Churchyard to make it clearer that cycling is not permitted in this area. Cyclists should either dismount and walk their bikes through the churchyard or use an alternative route.

While this isn't directly within the Town Council's remit, we've received feedback from residents about accidents and near misses, so we've stepped in to help improve safety and awareness and forwarded concerns to Oxfordshire County Council and the neighbourhood policing team.

Our team also cleaned graffiti on Witney Lake and Country Park Signage, as well as removing some hazardous trees that had fallen in various places. While the area isn't part of our usual maintenance responsibility, the team was nearby and understood the importance of ensuring immediate access, especially with cyclists and wheelchair users in the area.

#### **Bridge Street Silt Removal**

Bridge Street Silt Removal Works were recently underway near the south-west corner of the **Bridge Street bridge**, where residents might have noticed some activity over the past few days.

This maintenance project involved the **removal of a significant build-up of silt** that had accumulated at the base of the bridge over time. Although Witney Town Council was not the riparian owner responsible for this section of the river, we undertook this work in partnership with the Witney Flood Group to help alleviate a long-standing issue affecting nearby residents.

The build-up of silt could disrupt the natural flow of the river and contribute to blockages or **potential flooding**. By removing it, we helped maintain both the health of the river and the safety of the surrounding area. A crane was used to carefully lift the silt, gradually restoring the riverbed to its natural level. It was important to note that this was a **partial removal**, not a complete clearance of all silt.




### Children's Christmas Card Design Competition
